Definitions

Culture- is a pattern of learned beliefs, values, and behavior shared within a group; it includes language, communication styles, practices, customs, and views on roles and relationships.



Cultural CompetenceThe ability of individuals and systems to work or respond effectively across cultures in a way that acknowledges and respects the culture of the person or organization being served.





Health EquityProviding access to care that does not vary in quality because of personal characteristics such as race, ethnicity, gender, ethnicity, geographic location, language, religion, sexual orientation, and socioeconomic status.

Introduction & History of CLAS

- Define CLAS: Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Services.
 - Culturally and linguistically appropriate services (CLAS) are a way to improve the quality of services provided to all individuals, which will ultimately help reduce health disparities and achieve health equity.
 - CLAS is about respect and responsiveness: Respect the whole individual and Respond to the individual's health needs and preferences.





CLAS Rationale





Health inequities in our nation are well documented. Providing CLAS is one strategy to help eliminate health inequities. By tailoring services to an individual's culture and language preferences, health professionals can help bring about positive health outcomes for diverse populations.

The provision of health services that are respectful of and responsive to the health beliefs, practices, and needs of diverse patients can help close the gap in health outcomes. The pursuit of health equity must remain at the forefront of our efforts; we must always remember that dignity and quality of care are rights of all and not the privileges of a few.



CLAS Standards

- The National CLAS Standards are intended to advance health equity, improve quality, and help eliminate healthcare disparities by establishing a blueprint for health and healthcare organizations to:
 - Principal Standard
 - Governance, Leadership and Workforce
 - Communication and Language Assistance
 - Engagement, Continuous Improvement, and Accountability

Language Access Assistance: Ensuring effective communication for patients with limited English proficiency.



Culturally Competent Care Practices: Integrating cultural competence into healthcare delivery.




Structural Competence: Addressing systemic issues to eliminate health disparities.

- CLAS is essential because it helps to ensure that individuals receive quality health care that is respectful of and responsive to their cultural and linguistic needs.
- CLAS contributes to improved patient outcomes, increased patient satisfaction, and the reduction of health disparities.





Benefits of Becoming a Culturally Competent Health Care Organization






- *Increases mutual respect and understanding between patient and organization.

- *Improves patient data collection.
- *Increases preventive care by patients.
- *Reduces care disparities in the patient population.
- *Increases cost savings from a reduction in medical errors, number of treatments, and legal costs.
- *Reduces the number of missed medical visits.




Business Benefits
